## Spotlight on Trinity People



'All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy'. This cannot be said of Jim McCutcheon who combines the two very well; so well in fact he has started to play indoor bowling in his spare time!

Jim, a self employed carpenter, aged 60, lives with his wife Jean at Edenfel Park and is a member of the congregational committee in Trinity. Many examples of his work can be seen in the church buildings especially the alterations he carried out on the front pews on either side of the organ to facilitate wheelchair access. Born in Mountjoy, the youngest of three children, he attended Calkill Primary School and he has many happy memories of that time. He recalls how he used to help the local farmers and would at times milk the cows for them.

Playing football with the local lads took up any spare time there was and it wasn't long before they decided to start up a club called Mountjoy United that would compete in the Fermanagh and Western League. It has gone from strength to strength and has just celebrated its fortieth anniversary.

Jim went to Omagh High School and then to the local Training Centre where he followed a course in joinery and after receiving his qualifications he secured a job with the Western Health Board at the Tyrone and Fermanagh Hospital complex. It wasn't long before he discovered there was a hockey team and he was playing a prominent part in it. They took part in mixed leagues from 1977 to 1983 with great success. He recalls that they were so keen to get a game that when the snow was on the ground they would brush it off to play at lunch time. It was at this time he was approached by Philip Faithful to play for Omagh Men's Hockey Club and he still turns out for them when they have a game.

The key to Jim's long career in sport is keeping fit as he has gone on to play hockey at Inter Provincial and International level in the over 55s section. In 2013 he represented Ulster in the Inter Provincial over 55s tournament in Dublin and in the same year played for Ireland in the Celtic Cup in Glasgow against Scotland, France and Wales, scoring a goal against France and Scotland.

In 2014 Ireland called on Jim's services for the Hockey World Cup being held in Holland competing against Spain, Scotland, Holland and Wales in the first round. They then qualified to play Malaysia, France and Scotland. He scored against Malaysia and Scotland in very warm conditions having to take on lots of water. Ireland finished in ninth position overall. In the Holland game he remarked that the oldest man on the field was 85 and he turned out to be one of the fittest players. He played for Holland but he originally came from South Africa.

Asked about his experience of the World Cup Jim said the warm conditions played a major part as they had to play a match every day and they had a small squad. When I asked had he any notion of retiring, he told me that in 2016 the over 55s World Cup is being held in Australia and preparations are already in hand for this. He travels to Dublin one Saturday in the month to train for three hours and then drives home again. It can be very exhausting but that trip makes it worth the effort.

As a young boy Jim and a few of his friends thought they would like to try playing tennis and went to the courts at Campsie. This proved disastrous as they were told to go away and not come back. Years later Jim joined the club and has played regularly, winning many competitions in Enniskillen, Irvinestown and Sligo. He won the mixed doubles in Irvinestown with a lady from Belfast last year and says doubles are easier at his age.

Jim has many trophies to show for his long sporting career and in April 2014 he was presented with the Ulster Herald Sports Personality of the year and has been nominated for an award by the Omagh Sports Forum in 2015. In these times when the government agencies are telling us to keep fit and healthy surely Jim McCutcheon is a superb example of this to us all, young and old alike.

## "Reflections" – by a Gillygooley Member

***Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people. Remember that the Lord will give you an inheritance as your reward, and that the Master you are serving is Christ. (Colossians 3:23-24 NLT, second edition)***

Your boss is not really your boss. Your boss is Jesus.

There are two things to see in this verse:

- First, you will have a better attitude about work once you understand that, no matter where you work or who you work for, your real boss is Jesus. It's easier to be enthusiastic about your job when you stop thinking, "I'm doing this for my boss" or "I'm doing this for a pay cheque" and instead start thinking, "I'm doing this for the Lord." By understanding that truth, you can do anything — from running a company to washing dishes — and turn it into an act of worship.
- Second, when you turn your work into worship, you start storing up credits in Heaven. As you work for God, you are making eternal deposits in Heaven. It doesn't matter what you do, any job can become an act of worship if you do it enthusiastically for God: "*So whatever you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God*" (1 Corinthians 10:31 NIV).

***"Do everything with love."* (1 Corinthians 16:14 NLT, second edition)**

One of the most important keys to receiving God's favour in your work is this: You must care about the people you work with. Even when they are irritable, even when they don't like you, even when they make fun of you, even when they put you down for being a Christian, you must still be a friend to them.

Why is this so important for success? Because the number one lesson in life, the number one reason God put you on this earth, is to learn how to love. God is love, and he wants you to be like him.

It's easy to love people you like — the people you find it easy to get along with. So if God's going to teach you real love, realize that he's going to put you around unlovely people.

The Bible says, "*Do everything with love*" (1 Corinthians 16:14 NLT, second edition). "*Do everything*" — that means in the office, in the shop floor, on a sales trip — whatever. The good news is that it is really not hard. It's easy to underestimate the power of a kind word, a friendly smile, a pat on the back, a genuine compliment, a word of encouragement, and a listening ear.

So many people's lives can change when somebody takes time to pay attention to them. There is not a person on this planet who isn't starving for attention. But a caring person is hard to find. The Apostle Paul said, "*I have no one else like Timothy, who genuinely cares about your welfare*" (Philippians 2:20).

People need affirmation, attention, and affection. Learn to care about the people you work with and show them God's love.

*"Be humble and gentle. Be patient with each other, making allowance for each other's faults because of your love"* (Ephesians 4:2 TLB).

My name is Glenn McKinley and I'm 15 years old. I am a 4th year pupil at Omagh Academy and a member of Gillygooley Congregation. In early December this last year I applied to go on the Ulster Project, I was quite optimistic and I was hoping that I would get onto the project. Thankfully on the 12th January a letter arrived to confirm that I had been successful and I was over the moon. To add to this I had been chosen to go to Salt Lake City where both my sisters had been on the project in previous years. My project group have been meeting up every Thursday night, week after week to get prepared for different events like the St. Patrick's parade and now for a concert that we will perform just before we leave and again when we get over to America. Through the project I have already met many people from other schools and I will meet more people when I arrive in America. I do not know who my American host family is yet but I will find out closer to the time. As the clock counts down I'm getting more excited about the trip and I am also hoping that I might be able to meet up with the families that hosted my sisters and their friends.




Two DVDs were shown about Colombia – South America and one regarding Ethiopia.

## Sunday School and Bible Class Project 2014-15


During the year the children and young people of Trinity and Gillygooley have been collecting money for 'Project Emmaus' - the Youth and Sunday School Project of the Presbyterian Church in Ireland for 2014-15.

Project Emmaus will be supporting two initiatives, one in India and the other in Donegal, Ireland.

In India, there are about 31 million orphans. Many of these children are left to look after themselves as they have no one to care for them. If they are fortunate, they will find an orphanage where they can live.

The Bible Society in India is working in partnership with the churches by supplying items with God's message of hope and comfort. The items include: Bibles, schoolbags, notebooks, blankets, etc.

The money raised by PCI will help to finance the distribution of Bibles and other materials to children in orphanages all over India.



### Karishna

When Karishna was just six years old she arrived at the Bethel Church Hostel in Gujarat, India. She had no parents and no brothers or sisters – there was no one at all to care for her. She was very sick. She had leprosy. She also had tuberculosis. At the Hostel she found people who wanted to look after her. She was able to get medicine and the help that she needed. It took two years for the leprosy and the TB to clear and for her to be completely better.

Karishna is now thirteen years old. She still lives in the Hostel and has many close friends and people who care for her. She goes to school and her favourite subject is Social Studies.

At the Hostel the girls go to church. Karishna was given a Bible by the Bible Society in India and it helps her to know that God is her Father who loves her and takes care of her.



### Vishal

Vishal is nine years old. He lives in India, in a hostel out in the country near the jungle. He was brought to live there when he was very young. His grandmother was looking after him but she was finding it very hard. Now he lives in the hostel with lots of other children and is looked after by a pastor and his wife, and four teachers. Every day Vishal goes to school, does his chores, and plays with his friends. He sleeps in a room with about thirty other boys on bunk beds. Everything he owns fits into one suitcase.

Vishal is happy. He loves learning new things in school. His favourite subject is maths. He loves to hear stories from the Bible, and his favourite is the story of Jonah. He can say Psalm 23 and Psalm 100. In 2014 Vishal was given his very first Bible by the Bible Society in India. Now he can sit on his bed and read his favourite Bible stories himself.

### Donegal Town Presbyterian Church

In Donegal Town, the Presbyterian congregation is trying to encourage Bible engagement and relationship building among teenagers and young adults and is developing an area within the church building for young people. With the money raised, they plan to fit out a space in the church for young people to meet. Project Emmaus also hopes to provide resources for the youth work within the centre.
